

How to deal with Sportsfive newsletters ending up in Yahoo spam file

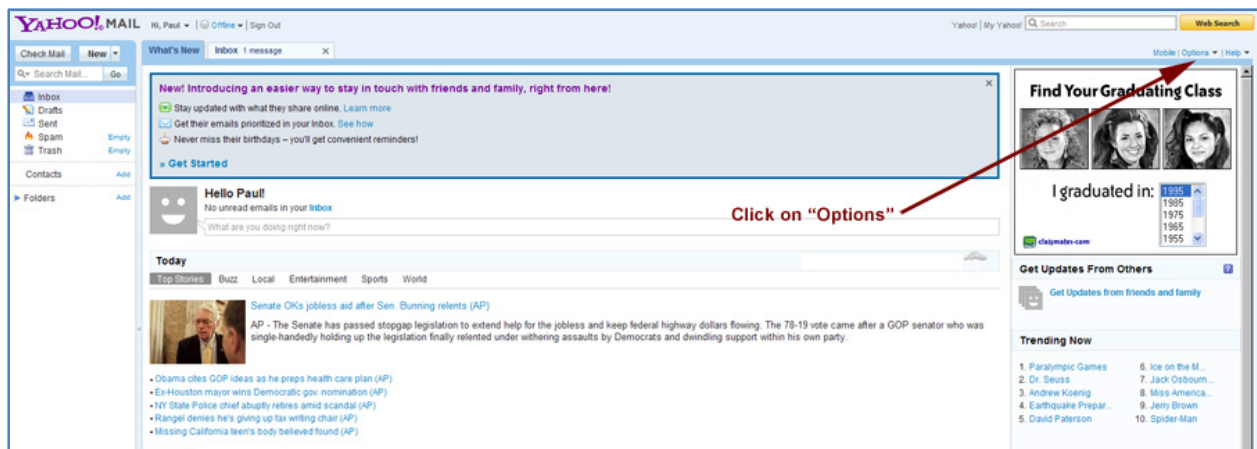
Yahoo mail, in their attempts to protect you from spam will sometimes decide that newsletters that you want is really spam. This is a long-standing issue and Yahoo has been working on a fix for a while.

At any rate, you can do two things to improve your chances of getting your SportsFive newsletters. First, put these two email addresses in your "contacts" list:

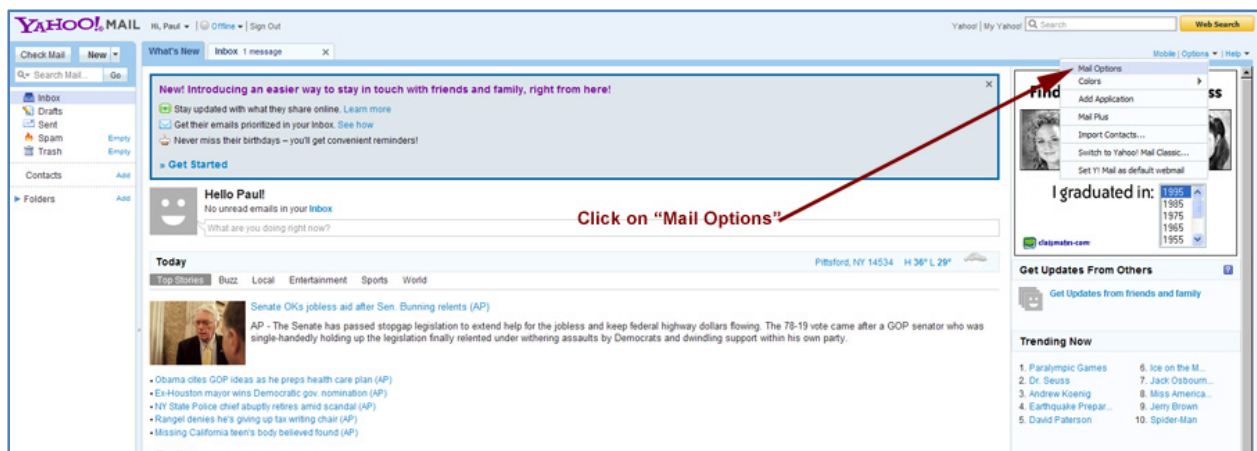
wilson@sportsfive.net and newsletter@sportsfive.net .

Second, follow these directions to create a "filter".

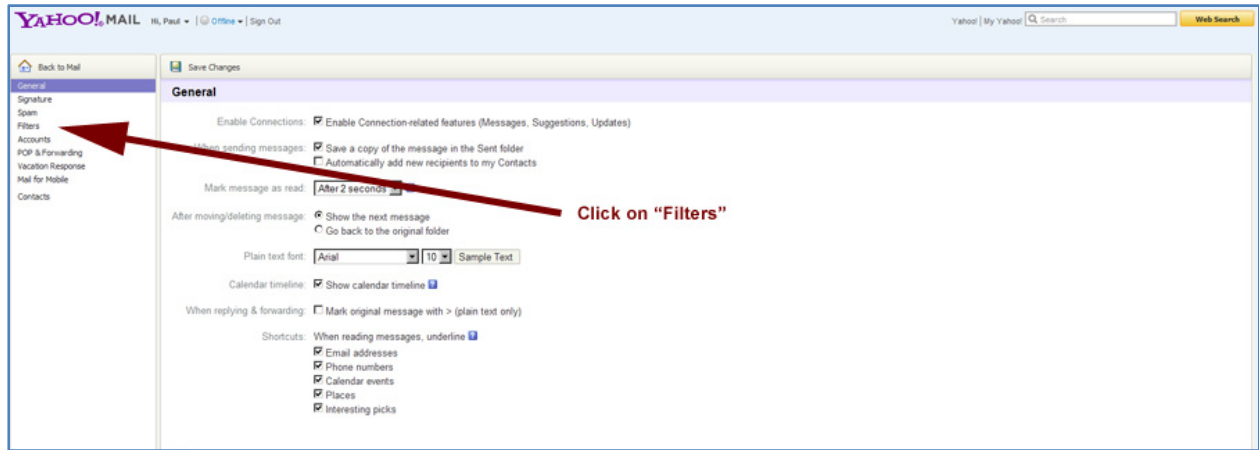

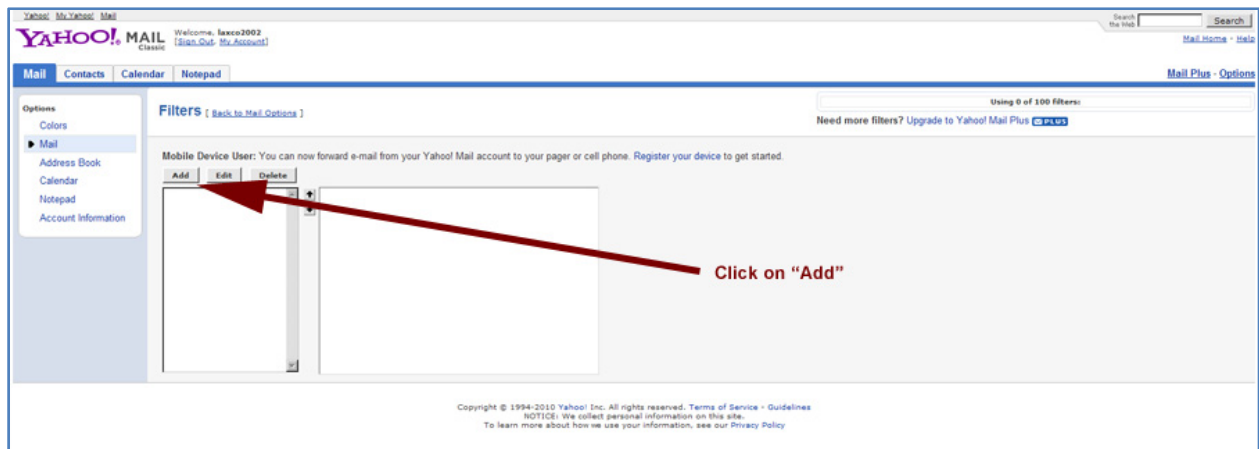

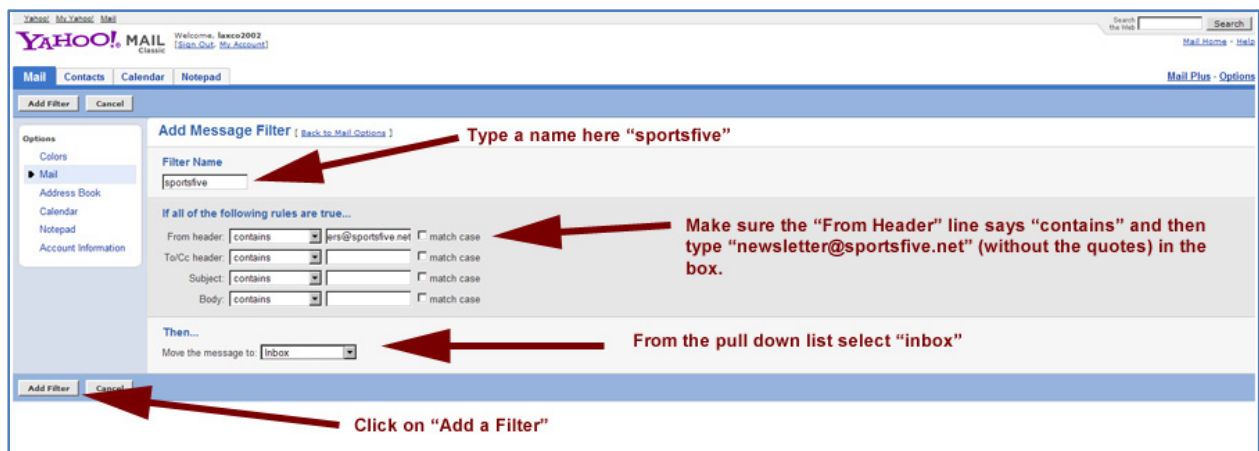
